The Shepherds' Trust is about caring for those who always cared for us – our retired priests.

This year, we reached out to parishioners, to understand better how our priests continue to be remembered and supported by people they have served in the past.

Parishioners shared dozens of uplifting stories, confirming how fortunate we are to have so many good memories of retired Priests.

These are the priests who helped us grow in faith, persevere through difficult times and who celebrated with us on joyous occasions such as baptisms, confirmations and weddings.

For our 2011 Shepherds' Trust campaign we chose two stories.

Maria Silva-Alto, a parishioner of St. Mary's in Brampton, shared her memories of Father Vid Vlasic. Father Vid became part of her life when he was the chaplain at Notre Dame High School in Toronto – in her words, he was not only a mentor, but a friend.

Maria and Father Vid reconnected when she was an adult and married with children, and he also inspired Maria's own children to embrace their faith.

This is the gift of a faithful legacy many of us receive from our retired priests.


Betty Klauke, a parishioner of Our Lady of Grace in Aurora, told us a moving story about her mother and

Ways of Giving to The Shepherds' Trust

There are various ways of making gifts to The Shepherds' Trust, each method offering tax benefits that may significantly reduce the cost of your gift:

1. Gifts of Cash

By far the most popular method of support, a gift of cash provides an immediate benefit to the Trust, and an instant tax receipt for you. You may receive a tax credit for a gift on up to 75% of your annual net income in any one year, and you may carry forward any excess for a period of up to five years. Spouses may combine their charitable receipts on one income tax return even if the receipts are not in both names.

Gifts of cash may be given through the parish on the weekend of November 12-13, 2011, or postdated cheques throughout the year. Cheques should be made payable to: Parish Name - The Shepherds' Trust. Donating online through a secure server is an option for those donors who prefer to give through our web site. This is a great way of taking advantage of credit card incentives. Your online donation will be credited to your parish. As well, "In Memoriam" and "Living Gifts" can be offered online. Visit our web site at www.shepherdstrust.org.

2. Bequests

A bequest is a specific provision in your will, directing various estate assets to be given to The Shepherds' Trust in return for a tax receipt for the full value of the bequest. This receipt can be used to reduce the tax payable on your final tax return and on the return of the previous year up to 100% of your net income.

These gifts can symbolize permanent memorials for you, your family or anyone you wish to honour.

3. Publicly Traded Stocks and Securities

Publicly traded stocks, bonds and other securities may also be gifted to The Shepherds' Trust. The tax on capital gains on publicly traded securities gifted to registered charities has been eliminated. In addition, donors will receive a tax receipt for the full amount of their gift.

Recently the Archdiocese of Toronto lost their former Shepherd. His Eminence, Cardinal Ambrozic died peacefully and is mourned by the priests of his flock and the Archdiocese as a whole. Aloysius Cardinal Ambrozic was 81 years old and lived for the past few years of his life at the Cardinal Ambrozic Houses of Providence.

While the care of the Houses of Providence was wonderful and his personal care workers were with him around the clock, his illness won and His Eminence passed away quietly on August 26, 2011.

His Eminence, Aloysius Ambrozic was born in 1930 in Dobrova, Slovenia and in 1945 fled to Austria where he lived with his family in refugee camps. In 1948 the Ambrozic family immigrated to Canada and settled in Markham, Ontario. When the young Aloysius Ambrozic entered St. Augustine's Seminary he did not realize it would be his spiritual home and that he would return there as a student, professor, bishop, archbishop and then cardinal.

Most of us are aware of the public facts of His Eminence's life but I had the privilege and pleasure of knowing the man that he truly was. Many years ago I was called to his office when the Archdiocese of Toronto Chancery Office was located at 355 Church Street. I was of course more than a little nervous about this meeting and wondered what I had done wrong. With a serious look on his face, the Cardinal asked me to take a seat. He then asked about my youngest daughter who was quite ill at the time and in hospital. I was surprised that he had heard that she was in hospital and even more surprised that he thought it important enough to call me to see him. We chatted for about half an hour and I spoke to him about the



surgeries my daughter had and needed. I was humbled knowing that this very busy man took the time to comfort me at a time that my family and I struggled to grasp the health issues my daughter had. Before I left I was assured by His Eminence that he would keep my daughter in his prayers for a speedy and healthy recovery.

Many years later as the Coordinator of Retired Diocesan Priests I had the pleasure to comfort Cardinal Ambrozic while he struggled with his own health issues. We don't often have the opportunity to directly repay a kindness in this way but I feel very fortunate that I was able to.

Like His Eminence many years ago I sat and listened as he tried to talk. I have sat and held his hand, and I greatly treasure a photo of the two of us taken at a time in his life when he needed help.

I feel fortunate to have been able to receive the support of His Eminence many years ago. But even more so I feel fortunate that I was there in his final years to show him my love of the church, and to have had the opportunity to care for him as he had cared for so many.

Your Eminence, I will treasure the memories that I have always and will now pray for your eternal rest.

Retired priest Father Paul Casullo thinks it is the elderly people who will keep this world together. "Young people make the world go round, but elderly people keep it sane! They contribute to the community where it matters most, because they pray."


Fortunately for the Archdiocese of Toronto, Father Paul continues to both pray and serve in his retirement. As a retired priest in residence at St. David's parish in Maple, he shared, "I moved here in July 2010, and I'm happy because I can function fully as a priest here." Pausing, he joked, "I try to look busy!"

Looking busy has probably never been a problem for Father Paul, who was a parish priest in the Archdiocese of Toronto from 1964 to 2006. "Serving people in the parish has always been my first desire", he shared.

His life as a priest has taken him from the Abbey of Gethsemani, in Trappist, Kentucky, to the Cistercian's New Foundation in Rochester, New York where he served for 12 years. He studied in Rome for two years, taught theology and looked after the novices until 1964. Throughout all of his years as priest, he has drawn on a strong prayer life to help him and the people he served.

When Father Paul arrived in Canada in 1964, his first parish was St. Ann's in Penetanguishene. "It was a small



parish, with many French-speaking parishioners – so I got to practice my French!" He also served at St. Monica's and at St. Thomas Aquinas, where he got to practice his Italian.

No doubt that practice came in handy when he was asked to build a new parish in the west end in 1970 – St. Jane Francis. "I arrived at St. Jane Francis to build the church with the parish community, and all I knew was how to be a priest – I didn't know how to be an administrator or a fundraiser," he acknowledged.

"I may not have been much good at making money, but if you save, you can also make money that way. We saved, scrounged, and I begged for donations, too. And we built that church for \$500,000 – a very good deal in those days!"

In 1979, Father Paul served at St. John the Evangelist, Weston until 1990, when he moved to Oshawa to be pastor at St. Mary of the People. "I served there for 16 years, before I retired", he said, "and then I moved to my sister's home in Maple."

At every parish, he confided, "I tried to profit from my 14 years as a Monk, to help people apply it to their daily life, to today. I think the scriptures are the most wise and sensible words ever spoken, because they were focused on helping people get by every day."

One of the best things about being retired for Father Paul is that he has more time to pray and to read. He is now reading the Divine Will – the writings of Luisa Piccarreta, and learning a lot from it.

When asked about what advice he might have for priests, Father Paul remembered his life at his many parishes: "Big parishes are very busy, and you need a disciplined approach to succeed, and you have to have time for your spiritual life. If you neglect your spiritual life, you won't have enough to give to your parish."

"Pray a lot, no matter how busy you are. If you pray, you will obey God and the law of love. If you don't pray, you will lose your way. Love makes you open up to others. No prayer, no love – you love only yourself."

Then he added, "Of course, that good advice for everyone, not just priests!"

Father Paul has two prayer groups right now. Through the Family of the Immaculate Heart, Father Paul meets and talks with people about our Lady, the sacraments, and the church. As well, "Whenever I see older people praying, I stop and pray with them," he shared. "When you pray, you may not get what you want but you get what God wants for you, the greatest good, even if you don't know how to ask for it."

"As Chaplain for the Ave Maria Centre, I've been on many trips", he reminisced "visiting Lourdes, Fatima, Medjugorje. The highlight for me is always the confessions," he said.

"You can spend three to four hours in the confessional – there you get to use your language skills! I'm happy because I'm able to help people with all kinds of problems, and sometimes people come back to their faith after 10, 20 or 30 years away." Father Paul also spoke about the young people, because when he worked in parishes, he was at the schools every week. He had this advice to share with young people: "Look up and respect and love your mother and father. They are your very best friends, and they are doing what no one else will do for you."

Do the best, and let God do the rest

"Look up to the elderly, they can share their knowledge and faith with you and for free." He believes, "the elderly have a treasure to offer you and you don't have to work for it — and it gives them a sense of being needed. Everyone needs to be needed."

There is no doubt that he is needed, and still very much appreciated in his retirement. He hears confessions on a daily basis at St David's. "I'm there every week night from 5 to 7, and I

also visit nursing homes, to say Masses and hear confessions."

And he still gets to practice his Italian for Masses and funerals. And who knows, maybe there is a book for him to write, to capture his quotable quotes, such as "Do the best, and let God do the rest", and "When you can't sleep, don't count the sheep – count on the Shepherd."

How does he have the energy to be so busy? "I'm 81 you know, and I run every morning, unless I'm sick," he said. "I've been running since I was 56. When you exercise, you're better conditioned for the people you serve, because you have a better disposition."

He paused, and then said, "and if you can't run, walk fast."

And that is one of Father Paul's greatest gifts – he makes you feel that you can succeed if you try, pray and let God help you.

Father Don MacLean. When Betty's Mom became sick, Father MacLean was there to visit and comfort her, despite the long distance.

This story is made more poignant by the fact that her Mom had long thought about becoming a Catholic, but had never acted on it.

Fr. Don travelled all the way down to Sunnybrook Hospital and received her into the church and anointed her just before she died. This was a blessing for the whole family, many of whom knew Father Don from their own weddings and baptisms.

Again, this demonstrates the legacy of a retired priest, who continues to

strengthen the faith of his former parish family as they remember him.

The 2010 investment income of \$2.4 million constitutes realized income of \$0.8 million and unrealized investment income of \$1.6 million due to an increase in market value of investments as at December 31, 2010.

Expenditures

2010 expenditures totalled \$2.7 million (2009 - \$2.8 million) consisting of monthly allowances to beneficiaries, health care premiums and costs of extended health care for priests.
